


Use the below 10 pages in class to test your pupils Knowledge about fake news.

Use this is a great way to have some open discussion and share ideas about fake news.








## 1: Which headline is not true?

A child turns orange after eating only orange foods [Publish on Fakenews.org]





Always check to see if it has been reported on other trustworthy sites and check to see if other credible sources also support the same story.





## 2: Which of these things would you do to check if something was real online?






1. Read it – Look for unusual URLs or site names – these are often trying to appear like true news sites, but they aren't. Look for signs of grammar or spelling errors, no source links or clickbait images.

2. Check it – Who wrote it? You can check the author on the page or go to the about us or contact pages to see who is the person or the organisation that have a Google search to see what else you can learn about this person or organisation from other sources to check if they are who they say they are.

3. Wait – Just because something has been shared on social media many times doesn't mean it's true. If something looks too good to be true, it probably is. You can also check if something is true or not by using factchecking websites






## 3: Can you tell the difference between a real ad or a clickbait ad? Pick 2 answers below.

When clicking on clickbait ads they can take you to websites that are filled with more ads, harmful content not for kids or to articles that make false claims. Although they are difficult to ignore (even for adults), try not to click on them to avoid seeing content you shouldn't.

Although most trusted websites end in .com, .co.uk, .org, for example, these can be purchased by anyone so that is not always a sign that a site is trustworthy.




5: Your best friend has sent you a link to a site that says the earth is flat and you're not sure if it's real, fake or a joke. How do you tell the difference?
